

NEWS FLASH!

At an emergency meeting of the Parish Council on Monday evening it was learnt that Sedgemoor District Council and SCC had done a **U Turn** on it's support for Otterhampton Parish Council and signed an Agreement of Common Ground with EDF Energy.

Item 8.9 of this agreement states:

"revisions proposed by EDF Energy and submitted to the examination on July 12th (Document EDFE_ADIF39) relating to Combwich are considered appropriate and reasonable and further controls are not considered necessary. For the avoidance of doubt this does not prejudice the case that may be made by local residents and Otterhampton Parish Council"

This agreement leaves Otterhampton PC isolated and without any support from the District and County Councils. Combwich has been sacrificed 'for the sake of the common good'. Whilst there have been some small concessions by EDF regarding Combwich the damaging impact of the major effects are still hanging over our heads.

OPC are determined to fight all the way to minimise the effect on Combwich and it is essential that you support them by attending the Combwich Specific Hearing at the Bridgwater Rugby Club on 24th August at 10.00am. Even if you have not registered there are public spaces available!

It is interesting that significant financial commitments for other areas have recently been made to SDC by EDF.
